

The Tsunami Disaster and Relief Efforts—A Message from UNA-USA

As we watch from afar, the Asian tsunami disaster appears to be one of the largest natural disasters in modern memory. The international response has been impressive as well and massive relief efforts are underway. At the center of the assistance being provided to the thousands of individuals and families impacted by this tragic event is the United Nations. The UN is coordinating donations flowing in from countries, individuals and nongovernmental organizations as well as administering relief through such UN agencies as the UN Children's Fund (UNICEF), the UN Development Programme (UNDP), the

World Food Programme (WFP), the World Health Organization (WHO) and others. The scale and scope of the relief effort is unprecedented, throwing a spotlight on the global network of UN agencies and field representatives that, in many ways, are best positioned to respond to the crisis.

At UNA-USA, we know you want to help. The following information explains how to lend a hand and spread the word.

Donate – and Donate Again: UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan and others have warned that those countries affected by the tsunami may not recover for a decade. With the death toll expected to surpass 150,000, another 1.8 million individuals are now in desperate need of food, according to UN Emergency Relief Coordinator Jan Egeland. The UN and all relief agencies are concerned at the enormity of the crisis, the anticipated respiratory and water-borne disease expected to abound, and the amount of time it will take to get basic services in afflicted countries up and running.

Donations are needed over the long term. Various UN agencies are accepting donations directly or through their US Committees. Carol Bellamy, executive director of UNICEF, has suggested that donations be made in cash rather than in-kind, and that checks be written without strings attached. A list of UN agencies accepting donations with contact information follows.

Take Notice of the Upcoming Flash Appeal: The UN will launch an emergency appeal to donors on January 6, 2005 to cover emergency needs for the next six months. This is expected to be one of the largest appeals ever for a natural disaster. To date, the UN has received \$2 billion in pledges and cash donations from some 40 countries; this total does not include in-kind contributions or military assistance.
