

EMTA WEBINAR: EM International Financial Architecture: Lessons Learned from Recent Restructurings

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ARTURO PORZECANSKI (MODERATOR) American University

Arturo Porzecanski is a professor of international economics at American University. He was previously on the faculty of Columbia University, New York University and Williams College, but academia since 2005 is his Second Act, having spent nearly three decades working as an international economist on Wall Street.

He served as chief economist for emerging markets at ABN AMRO Bank, ING Bank, and Kidder, Peabody & Co.; and previously as chief economist at Republic National Bank of New York and as senior economist with J.P. Morgan for a dozen years. He carries out and publishes research in international finance and provides consulting services to law and financial firms, as well as to U.S. government agencies and multilateral organizations.


Prof. Porzecanski, originally from Uruguay, holds a Ph.D. in economics from the University of Pittsburgh.

CHARLES BLITZER Blitzer Consulting

Charles Blitzer is the Principal of Blitzer Consulting, advising private and official sector clients on a broad range of global economic, financial, and capital markets issues including sovereign debt management and restructuring.

From 2001-2010, Dr. Blitzer was Assistant Director of the Monetary and Capital Markets Department at the International Monetary Fund where he led work on vulnerabilities of emerging market countries, sovereign debt management and restructuring, and global capital flows.

Prior experience included Managing Director and Chief International Economist for DLJ in London, Chief Economist of the World Bank's Moscow Office, and senior research fellow at MIT. Dr. Blitzer received his Ph.D. in economics from Stanford University.

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LEE BUCHHEIT

Lee C. Buchheit retired in 2019 after a 43 year legal career. Mr. Buchheit has worked on over two dozen sovereign debt restructurings over the last four decades and currently serves as a strategic adviser to the administration of President Juan Guaido in Venezuela.

AUGUSTO DE LA TORRE **Columbia University**

Augusto de la Torre is a professional economist that has combined research, writing, service at multilateral organizations, policy advice, and policy making throughout a rich career, with a special focus on Latin America.

De la Torre currently teaches at Columbia University's School of Public and International Affairs, in New York City; is the Director of the Economics Research Center at the Universidad de las Américas (UDLA) in Quito, Ecuador; and acts frequently as a senior policy consultant.

He left the World Bank at the end of 2016, after 20 years of service in various senior roles. In the first 10 years he concentrated in macroeconomic and financial sector themes, including as Head of the Global Financial Systems Department and as Senior Financial Sector Advisor for Latin America. In the last 10 years, he was the World Bank's Chief Economist for Latin America.

Prior to his World Bank career, he served as the Governor of the Central Bank of Ecuador (1993-1996) and worked at the International Monetary Fund (1986-1992), including in the post of IMF Resident Representative in Venezuela (1991-1992).

ANNA GELPERN **Georgetown University**

Anna Gelpert is an Agnes N. Williams Research Professor at Georgetown Law and a nonresident senior fellow at the Peter G. Peterson Institute for International Economics. She has published research on government debt, contracts, and regulation of financial institutions and markets. She has co-authored a law textbook on International Finance and has contributed to international initiatives on financial reform and government debt. She co-directs the Sovereign Debt Forum, a collaboration among Georgetown Law's Institute of International Economic Law and academic institutions in the United States and Europe, dedicated to cutting edge research and capacity building in sovereign debt management.

Before coming to Georgetown, she held full-time appointments at the American University Washington College of Law, Rutgers School of Law-Newark and Rutgers University Division of Global Affairs. She has held visiting appointments at Harvard and Penn law schools. Between 1996 and 2002, Professor Gelpert served in legal and policy positions at the U.S. Treasury Department. Earlier she practiced with Cleary Gottlieb, Steen & Hamilton in New York and London. Professor Gelpert has taught International Finance, Contracts, Commercial Law, Financial Institutions and International Law.

She earned an A.B. from Princeton University, a J.D. from Harvard Law School, and a M.Sc. from the London School of Economics and Political Science.
